Focus Ministry Grace Children's Ministry

n the halls of the children's wing here at Grace, there is a C.S. Lewis quote that says, "Children are not a distrac-L tion from more important work. They are the most important work." Children have always had a special place in my heart. That's why I feel blessed beyond measure to be the Director of Children's Ministry here at Grace! At the end of the day, my goal is for every child to know that they are loved by their Grace family, by me, and most importantly, Jesus!

When asked to write this article, I had no idea what to say or where to start; and let's be honest, I didn't want to talk about myself. So, I decided to highlight the programs I oversee and the lovely volunteers who are willing to serve the Lord, their church, and the families and children of Grace. When you see the volunteers listed, feel free to thank them for all they do.

The Children's Ministry covers children from birth to 5th grade.

Before a child is born, they are signed up for our Cradle *Roll* program. This program is organized by **Sandy Heath**. She prepares the packets and gifts that are given to the families of the newborns. Sandy then finds sponsors who will give the families cards, pamphlets, and books supporting them in the child's development both physically and spiritually.

We have a great *Nursery* filled with staff who love babies and toddlers as much as I do! They lovingly care for children during the Sunday services and any other special events that may occur. Our nursery coordinator, Brenda Gaddis, keeps everyone scheduled, trained, and everything germ free.

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Our large event this summer was Vacation Bible School. Marlene Landon (who has volunteered in Children's Ministries for 35 years) once again fearlessly jumped in to lead it! She's organized curriculum and crafts, as well as recruited volunteers. Planning and preparation began in January, and during the week of July 15-18, we welcomed 150 children onto Grace's campus. Approximately 75 percent of the children attending were not Grace

> members, and we have many children who return year after year! It's a great testimony to the heart of the volunteers and to the program itself.

On Sunday mornings, you may have heard our children's choir, Joy-Full Noise, sing at the 8:00 or 9:30 service. Deb Wolfe leads them in various songs and sometimes they partner with the adult choir. One of my favorite sounds is to hear children singing and this group does not disappoint! Check

them out on December 8th at 5:00 for our annual Christmas program.

Our mid-week program is called *Joy Group*, which meets on Wednesday nights during the church service. We have various Bible lessons, do crafts, and play games. Our summer lesson was based on the creation story (using Legos) for the younger class, 3-year-olds through 2nd grade; and the 3rd through 5th grade class covered the Old Testament. Joy Group is led by me, LaTina Haynes, Rachel Stock, and Rich Cole.

Sundays are our busiest days. From 9:30 to 10:40 is our *Sunday School* time. We have classes available for 2year-olds through 5th grade. During the summer, they took a welldeserved break and returned on Rally Day, August 11, ready to go. During the summer, we combine classes and parents volunteer to teach. Overall, they have 46 collective years of service here at Grace!

During the 11:00 service, we have *Children's Church*. Children aged 4-years-old through 3rd grade are dismissed before the sermon. They receive an ageappropriate Bible lesson and return to the service during the announcements. It is led by **Kristine Meade**, **Anna Wilson**, **Laura Big Eagle**, **Margie Frizzell**, and **Susan Klemmer**.

I have other volunteer staff not yet mentioned. **Hank Jones** leads our monthly Sunday school opening. He gives a lesson, leads music, and ends with a magic trick. His patience knows no end. He has been leading this for at least 15 years! **Becky Strickland** is our snack guru! She stealthily stocks the downstairs classrooms with the allimportant snacks! Combined with her teaching Sunday school, she has been a volunteer for over 10 years! **Cydne Albers** is our Sunday School secretary. She has held this position for over 25 years! She takes weekly attendance and helps in other areas as needed.

It is my joy and honor to work alongside everyone mentioned above! There are never enough words to express what they mean to me! Most are long-term volunteers, serving for over 5 years or more! Their love and dedication for God and the children of Grace cannot be beat! I enjoy being able to work alongside them and provide everything they need to make each program successful. 

How Things Got to Be as They Are

renjoy knowing how things got to be as they are. Many puzzling things become clear.

As the western Roman Empire fell Greek learning was largely lost to the West. Islamic scholars in the east and the Byzantine Empire preserved Greek learning. As Arabs took over Spain they brought libraries with Greek documents. When the Arabs were pushed out of Europe later, those libraries fell to Western scholars and Greek learning was again available. The Crusades also captured documents by Greek authors that had been in Islamic hands. Later the Byzantine Empire fell and Greek documents made their way west.

There was saying in the Middle Ages that, "Theology is the queen of the sciences, and philosophy is her handmaiden." Theologians eagerly mixed Greek philosophy with theology. Roman Catholics leaned on Aristotle. People like Zwingli made use of Plato. The thinking of Aristotle heavily influenced Roman Catholic teaching about the Lord's Supper so that bread and wine were believed to be changed into the body and blood of Christ. Zwingli was very much influenced by Plato and referred to baptism and the Lord's Supper as only outward ordinances representing inner spiritual realities. That is something you may hear today from Zwingli's spiritual followers. Noteworthy is that excitement over Greek learning meant pre-Christian Greek philosophy became a framework for Christian theology among some.

Plato believed spiritual things within our minds are reality. Material things are only illusions. Our physical bodies are inhabited by an evil twin of ourselves that pulls us to do things we know are bad for us. It creates harmful desires in us. Death is a friend because it will free our good soul from our evil bodies and their troubling urges. The people of Corinth had absorbed this thinking over four centuries. Then Paul came proclaiming Jesus and His resurrection. His good news for them in 1 Corinthians 15 was that they would be getting new bodies for eternity—no separation from bodies to reunite with the great world soul as they had hoped. Yet, the Gospel was turned people's hearts and Paul built a congregation there.

Zwingli applied Plato to baptism and the Lord's Supper. He considered both only material things, and therefore of no value, except that Jesus commands them. The important thing was for someone to think about faith and remembering what Jesus did.

The New Testament says the same benefits we receive by faith are given also through baptism: rebirth (Titus 3:5), forgiveness of sins (Acts 2:38, 22:16), bestowal of the Holy Spirit (1 Corinthians 12:13), membership in God's people—the church (1 Corinthians 12:13), salvation (1 Peter 3:21), new life now and the promise of the resurrection from the dead (Romans 6:3-11). For Zwingli and his descendants baptism is a command to keep. For Lutherans it is an act by which God blesses us with His grace and makes us His.

Cure for High Blood Pressure

A ccording to a study published in "*Nature Genetics*", British researchers have identified a gene variant that causes a common type of high blood pressure and a way to cure it. A tiny nodule present in one in 20 people with hypertension produces a hormone, aldosterone, that controls the amount of salt in the body. Researchers discovered that a gene variant in some of the nodules leads to a large, but intermittent, overproduction of the aldosterone hormone Too much aldosterone causes an overload of salt and drives up blood pressure. Individuals with hypertension caused by an excess of aldosterone are resistant to successful treatment with commonly used drugs for hypertension, putting them at an increased risk for heart attack and stroke. Researchers found that surgically removing one of the two adrenal glands cures hypertension, even severe cases, with no further treatment required. An individual can live with only one adrenal gland. Also, an adrenalectomy is the surgical removal of one or both adrenal glands, and is done if the adrenal glands make too many hormones, or if there is cancer in the adrenal gland. Researcher Morris Brown, M.D., of Queen Mary University of London said, "Because the aldosterone nodules in the study were so small, we are now investigating whether momentary cauterization of the nodule is an alternative to surgical removal of the whole gland."
